What is Assessment?

- Assessment looks at how well your child is progressing across all of their subjects.
- Your child will be assessed in numerous ways such as:
 - Quizzes
 - Tests
 - Answering questions in class
 - Classwork
 - Homework
- Two main types of assessment
- 1. Formative Assessment
- 2. Summative Assessment





Formative Assessment

- Louth Academy place huge significance on regular formative assessment to inform classroom practice
- Formative assessment occurs in every lesson and allows students to demonstrate their understanding of the content covered
- The methods of formative assessment used are wide ranging and varied
- They are also low stakes to increase inclusivity
- Allows class teacher to make regular judgements of the understanding of class/individuals and amend teaching and future planning accordingly



Summative Assessment Process

- Students in years 10 and 11 have two assessment points during each academic year
- All assessments involve sitting exams in the sports hall to prepare students for their GCSE examinations
- Exams test student knowledge and understanding against course specifications set by the relevant exam boards
- Students then receive a grade on the GCSE 9-1 grading system or an equivalent score for other qualifications e.g. BTEC Level 2 Pass
- Every assessment is followed by communication with home through Report Comments or Parents Evening

Value of Summative Data

- Provides a summary of where students are, at a particular point in the learning journey
- Allows leaders to identify any trends in student progress
- Informs a targeted intervention programme
- Facilitates the identification of content which may need to be revisited or re-taught
- An opportunity to adapt planning and teach areas of weakness before moving on to new content
- Helps students identify subject areas in which they need to attend additional revision sessions



Aspirational Targets

- Target Grades for students are generated using nationally recognised data and benchmarks
- Student progress is measured against these generated targets
- As an Academy we place a significant emphasis on providing aspirational targets for students in years 10 and 11
- An aspirational target is the best possible grade we feel a student can achieve in each subject area
- We feel it is vital that students understand their maximum capability in each subject and strive to achieve these targets



Reporting to Parents/Carers

Example of how assessment information is reported:

Subject	End of GCSE Target Grade	Assessment Grade 14	Progress	Aspirational Target

Student Planners

- Students have a yellow assessment page for each subject in their planners
- Planners will highlight target and aspirational grades for students' in each subject area
- Students record progress scores and improvement strategies in their planners after each summative assessment
- Improvement strategies are crucial in articulating to students and parents/carers how they can improve in each subject area
- Students should have planners out on the relevant subject page in all classroom based lessons



Revision Tips

- Revise in a quiet area with no music playing
- Be organised and plan a revision schedule
- Identify gaps in understanding and focus on these areas
- Eat a healthy diet. Studies show skipping breakfast results in lower cognitive function
- Stay hydrated. If water levels are low, brain cells cannot function properly
- Aim to get 8-10 hours sleep each night. Lack of sleep negatively impacts an individual's ability to focus and learn efficiently
- Use the Academy website for advice on different revision methods
- When revising put any technology in another room. THIS INCLUDES PHONES!



Strategies to Support Students

- Alongside revision we recommend students partake in the following activities to support their learning:
 - Attend extra-curricular enrichment sessions
 - Take advantage of the extensive range of revision sessions provided
 - Speak to teaching staff about content they find challenging
 - Utilise digital learning programs made available by Louth Academy –
 Sparx Maths, Reading Plus, Languagenut
 - Use subject specific websites. For example, Corbett Maths
 - Speak to relatives about content covered in lessons
 - Read for pleasure
